
## Messy Roots: A Graphic Memoir of a Wuhanese American

## **SYNOPSIS**

In *Messy Roots*, Laura illustrates her coming-of-age as the girl who simply wants to make the basketball team, escape Chinese school, and figure out why girls make her heart flutter.
