

STUDY NOTES

- Introduce Finding YOU to the children and ask them what they think the story might be about.
- Where do the boy and dog go on their adventures? Are other people pleased to see them or not?
- What is the connection between the boy and the dog? How do they relate to each other? Ask the children to think of a name for the boy and the dog. What name would the dog call his human? And what name would the boy call the dog?
- Ask the children what 'kindness' means. This can then move on to talking about empathy and compassion. This book

offers a good opportunity to talk about homelessness and those less fortunate.

- What's the twist at the end of the story? Did anyone guess the twist earlier on?
- Ask the children if they have a close bond with a pet/animals? What sort of relationship is it? Playful, comforting, fun, etc?
- How do you think the boy feels at the end of the story? What do you think might happen next?
- Can you think of another title for this book?
- After reading the book, ask them what they thought of the story. Which was their favourite part and why?
- Draw a picture of the boy and the dog. What adventure are they having together? You could use an idea from the story or make up your own adventure.
- Design a card to give to a friend to show them how much you care about them. Think about different reasons why you could give them a card. It could be after you've had a disagreement as a way of making up to them or just because you want them to know that you think they are a fabulous friend.
