When a rude lady with a net and a stick turns up to claim him, Etta must decide where Oswald really belongs.


ABOUT THE AUTHOR

STUDY NOTES

SCIENCE

- Research octopuses and discuss their unique features. (Hint: Etta's Octopus Fact Sheet [p 16] could include some real facts.)
- How happy do you think an octopus would be living in an aquarium tank? Should sea animals be kept in captivity?
- Find out more about the real life octopus named Inky, that escaped from New Zealand's National Aquarium In 2016. Discuss your findings as a class.

HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES (HASS)

- What does this story suggest about friendship?
- Etta is initially a little concerned about Oswald's antics but later enjoys them. What changes her mind?

ENGLISH LANGUAGE & LITERACY

- Why do you think the story is told in third person, rather than from Etta's first person point of view?
- Language can be used in a playful way to describe an activity, by juxtaposing words, for example, 'They walked in the promenades, and promenaded through the walkways.' (p 40) Try writing a sentence like this by juxtaposing words, for example, 'They paraded on the dance floor and danced on the parade.'
- Test your students' comprehension of words used by discussing the events which take place in this story. Ask them to finish the following sentences:
 - Etta likes having Oswald as a friend because he is
 - Oswald likes to eat
 - Oswald doesn't like
 - During their walk in the Big City, Oswald gives Etta
 - Marina Prinkle visits Etta because she wants to reclaim
- How would you describe Etta?
- What sort of person is Marina Prinkle?
- Etta's Granny is mentioned a number of times. Where do you think she is?
- Write another short story about Oswald's antics.
- Write an acrostic poem using the letters in OSWALD OCTOPUS.
- In order to keep Oswald busy, Etta suggests a number of activities: they made cubbies, put on a puppet show, made cupcakes and played board games. What other activities might Etta have suggested to keep Oswald busy? Write a few sentences describing them.
- Make a funny list of foods that Oswald might like to create in Etta's kitchen, for example, seaweed pancakes.

VISUAL LITERACY

- Oswald is said to be helpful but on p 37 he is actually removing the posters, not putting them up. And he steals the ice-cream, balloons and newspaper which he gives to Etta (pp 38–9). Examine all the illustrations closely and encourage students to discuss the details they discover in them.
- Create a comic strip version of Etta meeting Oswald.
- Design a new cover for this book.
- What is the craziest thing you can imagine Oswald doing? Draw a picture of him doing it.

MSCHOLASTIC

- Etta wears a very fetching hat with bunny ears. Make a hat just like it.
- Design a Missing Octopus Poster and draw a picture of Oswald on the poster. Make him look as charming as possible! Then compare your pictures with rest of the class and display them.
