

SYNOPSIS

STUDY NOTES

BEFORE READING

- Have a look at the front cover. What do you think this book will be about?
- Why do you think the book is called Itty Bitty Kitty? What does 'Itty Bitty' mean? Is this kitten really big or really



small?

- Describe the character (Itty Bitty) on the cover. How do you think she is feeling in this picture?
- What was the last book you read, and did you enjoy it? Are you excited to read this book?

WHILE READING

Comprehension

- Itty Bitty's friend Ginger always has a lot of advice to give. Is it good advice?
- Does Ginger always tell the truth? Is there ever a time when it's okay to lie? Why/why not?
- Itty Bitty is confident that she can do anything. Is she always right? When did you last feel confident?
- Is Itty Bitty always careful and considerate of her humans?
- Itty Bitty loves to play and have fun. Can you find some examples of the ways she likes to play? Does she play on her own or with others?
- Itty Bitty has a lot of action words to describe the way she moves, like DOUBLE PAW SWIPES and POUNCE AND TRAP. Can you make a list of these actions? Can you think of any other actions Itty Bitty might use?
- In each of these stories, Itty Bitty shows us her Cat Laws. Are the Cat Laws the same at the start and end of each story?

Story 1

- Itty Bitty meets some birds. How does she talk to them?
- Itty Bitty describes how tall Dad Human is. How many kittens tall is he?
 - How many kittens tall do you think you would be?
- Both Leo and Itty Bitty climb the tree. What happens to each of them?

Story 2

- This story is set at night-time. Can you tell just from looking at the illustrations? How?
- What techniques does Itty Bitty use to try and wake Leo? Can you list them?
 - Can you come up with some other options?
- Itty Bitty looks for someone to play with. What happens? Who does she play with in the end?
- There is a map of the kitchen. What do we see on the map? How does that show us what is important to Itty Bitty? How would you draw a map of your kitchen?

Story 3

- What is Mum Human doing at the start? Is Itty Bitty really helping? How do you think Mum Human feels here?
- Itty Bitty goes to hide behind the bookcase after she knocks over Mum Human's coffee. Why does she do this? What does this show us about how Itty Bitty is feeling?
- What does Itty Bitty think she needs to do to stop her family from sending her to the shelter? Why does she think this?

Text and Visual Literacy

- The stories about Itty Bitty are funny. One way they make us laugh is through the difference between what Itty Bitty thinks and what is actually true, like when she thinks that Dad Human raked the leaves just for her. Can you find any other examples of jokes like this?
- Sometimes we can see these jokes in the illustrations, like when Itty Bitty says that she has climbed really high but we see in the art that she has barely left the ground. Are there other places where the text and art don't match? Can you describe what you see?
- Itty Bitty often calls human features by the names of cat features, like calling their hands 'paws'. Can you find other examples of this?

Social and Emotional Development

- In Story 1, Itty Bitty meets some birds. How do they make her feel? How does she react to their behaviour? Have you ever felt like Itty Bitty does here?
- In Story 1, Itty Bitty is climbing a tree when her paws tremble and her stomach starts to feel funny. Have you ever felt like this before? What made you feel better?
- We know that Itty Bitty is very excited to be up and playing at night in Story 2. But how do you think the rest of the

- family feels in this story?
- In Story 3, Itty Bitty thinks that her family is going to take her back to the shelter and she runs away. This is an example of a misunderstanding. Can you think of a time when you've had a misunderstanding with your friends or family? How can misunderstandings be avoided?

AFTER READING

- Which was your favourite Itty Bitty story in this book? Why?
- Do you have any pets at home? Do they act like Itty Bitty?
 - Draw your pet in the space below. If you don't have a pet, you might like to draw your dream pet or favourite animal instead.
- Do you find the stories funny? Why? Why not? What do you think makes something funny?
- Would you recommend this book to a friend?
- There are two other books in the Itty Bitty series—do you want to read those now that you have read this one?
